The Price of Fuel and The Shooting Sports

Steve Garbe wrote a very insightful editorial in the latest issue of the Black Powder Cartridge Rifle News. He pointed out that the high cost of transportation and the time to get from one place to another are not new issues in the competitive shooting sports. Many years ago the postal and telegraph matches were very popular. These matches allowed many competitors who were geographically far apart to enjoy competition with their sporting arms without incurring the high cost of transportation and time in transit.

We in rural America are used to traveling long distances, but maybe we should give some serious thought to holding some of the postal and telegraph (telephone & computer) matches that were so popular back in the heyday of competitive shooting in the late 1800s and early 1900s.

Steve pointed out that today's communication devices make these matches much easier to run now than they were a hundred years ago. We have been doing this for many years now with our North Dakota Air Gun Postal match that we hold during the winter months. The following are some more examples of these types of matches that we could consider:

- 1. A match where two or more clubs run a challenge match on the same day to fire targets at their own ranges and combine the scores for club teams and individuals to determine the winners. We might even be able to try this with clubs outside the state of North Dakota.
- 2. A postal match where individuals fire targets within a given time period (30 days) and the scores sent to the match director who then compiles them individually as well as into randomly chosen teams based on shooter classification to determine the winners.
- 3. Individual shooters and teams could fire match scores witnessed by other shooters over a period of two or three months to determine the highest of these scores in any shooter's classification. An individual or team might fire as many match scores as they like in an effort to improve their standing during the two or three month period. Only the highest score would be recorded in the final results, but the individual and team scores could be posted regularly at a website as the match progressed to add a competitive flavor to the competition.
- Our air gun postal match is a great example of how much benefit shooters can realize by participating in this type of competition. If you do not already shoot

with us in this series of air gun postal matches over the winter months, I invite those of you who do not currently own an air gun to purchase a match air pistol or rifle and join us. With your match air gun, you will be firing the very best firearm available. The initial cost of the firearm is easily amortized by the very low cost of ammunition and the opportunity to fire safely and conveniently in your own home or garage without incurring the high cost of transportation.

No doubt there are many more of these types of matches that we might like to try. While I do not think that we should try to replace the shoulder to shoulder matches, I do believe that these postal and "telegraph" matches may be very useful in broadening our opportunities for competitive shooting in North Dakota.

Talk the idea over with other shooters at the next shoulder to shoulder match that you attend and see how you all feel about the idea. If you agree and would like to take part in a match like any one of these that I have described above, send me an email or give me a call. Maybe we can set one up yet this year. Certainly, we can arrange to make one or more of these competitions a part of our competitive shooting schedule next year.

Our North Dakota clubs offer a very full slate of shoulder to shoulder shooting events in 2008. I hope you will take time to plan your participation by reviewing the event schedule on page 5. Again, the clubs that sponsor these events don't do it for the money. They and the match directors put their time and effort into running these matches to benefit the shooters. So, grab your guns and ammo and head out to these matches. Enjoy yourself. Your participation and enjoyment are really the payment that the clubs and match directors need in order to continue their efforts.

Remember how fortunate we are to have the opportunity to take part in the shooting sports here in North Dakota. Again, I am reminded of the great article in USA Shooting's Newsletter about 3 months ago that made it clear that our volunteers make the shooting sports what they are today. That is true at all levels of our shooting sports.

Exercise your privilege to participate in the shooting sports. Failure to exercise a privilege often results in its loss.

Palma & X course High Power Rifle

Twenty-eight shooters enjoyed the June 14 & 15, 2008 weekend shooting Palma and F-class matches on Saturday, and an eighty-shot across the course match on Sunday. The Palma match consisted of fifteen record shots at each of 800, 900, and 1000 yards for a possible aggregate score of 450. This match is fired prone with a sling, using iron sights, and shooting the .308 Winchester cartridge. The F-class match is any rifle, any sight, and any reasonable support; but is also fired prone. Sunday's match was twenty shots at each of 200 yards slowfire offhand, sitting rapidfire, also at 200 yards; prone rapid fire at 300 yards, and slow prone at 600 yards for a possible aggregate score of 800.

Thomas A. Thompson of Bismarck was the match winner of the Palma, with an aggregate of 425 and 14 x's, or center shots. X's are used to break ties. Thompson helped his effort by winning the 800-yard match with a perfect score of 150-7x, and the 900-yard match with 139-6x. He also came within one point of Thomas C. Reiten's winning score of 137-4x in the 1000-yard match. Reiten, of Grand Forks, trailed Thompson in the aggregate with 405-10x.

Top F-class honors went to Toby Hauk of Bismarck with an aggregate of 418-8x. He also won the 800-yard and 900-yard matches with 148-3x and 141-3x, respectively. Bryce Loehrke of New Salem won the 1000-yard F-class match scoring 138-3x.

High Master class shooter Thomas Thompson continued his winning ways in Sunday's 80-shot match by scoring an aggregate of 759-18x. Thompson was also match winner in the 300-yard prone rapidfire match, and the 600-yard slow prone match with 198-5x, and 195-7x respectively. Master class shooter, Coby Dalgleish of Sarles, N.D., won the 200-yard slowfire offhand match with 180-3x; and also the 200-yard sitting rapidfire match with 195-6x.

In the Master Unclassified field first place went to Brendan Headrick of Bismarck with 689-14x. Competitors that haven't shot enough to establish a classification must shoot as Master Unclassified. Junior shooter Ethan Headrick of Bismarck took first in the class in the 200-yard slowfire offhand match with 168-2x. Another Junior, Peter Thingelstad of Grand Forks placed first in the class in the 200-yard sitting rapidfire match with 193-4x. Thingelstad also took top honors in the class in the 600-yard slowfire prone match by posting a 180-1x. Ethan Headrick's father, Brendan Headrick won the 300-yard prone rapid fire match with 188-3x.

Top aggregate score in the combined Expert, Sharpshooter, Marksman class was a 712-6x fired by James Kringlie of Fargo. Junior shooter Jennifer Garbina of Bismarck won the 200-yard slowfire offhand match in the class, firing a 169-1x. The 200-yard rapidfire sitting in the class went to Travis Carico of Valley City with 192-3x. James Kringle won the 300-yard prone rapid match with a 188-2x. Travis Carico came back to win the 600-yard slow prone by posting a 176-3x.

Special awards went to High Senior Thomas Reiten, with 735-14x, and High Junior Jennifer Garbina with 704-9x.

Black Powder Cartridge Rifle in North Dakota

This spring, thanks to Tom Reiten and Ray Hanson, those of us who enjoy shooting black powder cartridge rifle have been given more opportunity to improve and practice our skills. Tom and the Forks Rifle Club arranged with Ray to put on a clinic on April 12th and then hosted a prone match for Midrange Target BPCR on June 7, 2008.

June 7th was a great day in North Dakota, but the weather conditions for the match included a full value wind as most matches held in North Dakota do in the spring time. However, this match was the first one where the value of the wind required that I aim at my upwind competitor's target in order to get my shots to strike on my own. Even with my sights at maximum windage, the 410 grain bullets from my 40-65 wouldn't strike my target at the 600 yard distance. Even by aiming at my neighbor's target, I had to add some more windage before I could fire scoring shots onto my own target.

Ray's April clinic provided a lot of valuable information. By incorporating many of the techniques that Ray presented in his April clinic, the competitors in the June match enjoyed more success than they had in the past even though they were shooting under very tough wind conditions. To fire a respectable score in tough conditions is truly enjoyable. This game is challenging in the best weather conditions, but I sure enjoy it and believe that many of you will agree.

The top 3 finishers were:

Curt Grorud with a score of 271-3x

Ray Hansen with a 270-3x

Rick Jorgenson with a 269-5x

As you can see, any one of these top 3 finishers still had an opportunity to win the match, as they fired their last shot down range at 600 yards.

We had only 9 competitors fire the June 7th match, and we would sure like to see more of you join us. You have some time before the next scheduled match, so take some time this summer to get that BPC rifle out to the range. Plan to join us in the fun at one or both of these scheduled matches: BPCR –Midrange Target State Championship on August 23 at Grand Forks

BPCR - Silhouette State Championship on September 20 & 21 at Bismarck

Maybe you will begin to understand why many of us feel that smokeless powder may be only a passing fad for many of the old rifle and pistol cartridges. (Although, I still have not found that black will work well in my .45 ACP) Rick Jorgenson

Black Powder Cartridge Rifle Silhouette

Bismarck/Mandan Rifle & Pistol Assn Spring BPCR Silhouette Match was held May 17, 2008 under very tough and exasperating conditions, with 15 participants braving the nasty wind. Winds were wicked (I'm getting tired of saying that!) gusting to 47 mph in the afternoon. Otherwise, it was a moderate sunny day, with only the high winds to make things irksome. Even "sta-put" mats were blowing across the range.

We could not even keep any of the targets up except the chickens, and had to immediately, before even beginning the match, resort to using duct tape to secure them to the rails.

Trying to hold a full-length scoped rifle in that wind felt like you were holding a 2 x 6 out there. Some amazingly good scores were fired under the circumstances. The chickens were mighty hard to come by, but Bismarck's Steve Allen managed to nail three for high chicken count. Charlie Young and Ray Hanson each got all 10 pigs. My partner Gregg Simon knocked down 8 turkeys for the high on those, and also managed to take high rams, in a tie with Charlie Young with 6 apiece.

Bismarck/Mandan Rifle and Pistol Association Spring Warm-up Match

Twenty-four rifle shooters from North Dakota, Minnesota, and Nebraska enjoyed a break in the breezy spring weather to compete in long range and across-the-course matches over the weekend of May 3 and 4, 2008. The matches were sponsored by the Bismarck-Mandan Rifle & Pistol Association, and held on their ranges southeast of Bismarck.

Three, twenty-shot matches were fired at 1,000 yards on Saturday for a possible 600 point aggregate score. Thomas Reiten of Grand Forks took top honors in the conventional rifle division with a score of 553 and 10 x's, (center shots), for the aggregate. He was match winner in the first of the three matches with a 185 and 5x's, as well as posting a 185 with 1 x in match two, and a 183 with 4 x's in the third match. Thomas Thompson of Bismarck got off to a slow start in match one with a score of 169 and 2 x's, but came back with match winners in both the second and third matches with 186 and 4 x's and 186 and 6 x's, respectively. Thompson finished with an aggregate of 541 and 12 x's for second place.

An "F"-Class division, (any rifle, any sight, any reasonable support), was shot concurrently with the conventional rifle division. Nathan Dagley of Center had the high aggregate with a score of 539 and 2 x's. He was followed by Donovan Moran of LaMoure, and Toby Hauck of Bismarck with scores of 518 and 4x's, and 506 and 4 x's, respectively. In match one, Dagley's winning score of 182 and 1x was closely followed by Neal Emery of Grand Island, Nebraska, and Donovan Moran with scores of 179 and 2 x's, and 168 and 1x, respectively. Dagley was again the winner in match two, scoring 180 and 1x. Donovan Moran and Toby Hauck of Bismarck followed with scores of 175, no x, and 165, no x. Toby Hauck was the winner of match three with 183 and two x's. He was followed by Jeremy Duckwitz of Hazelton with 179 and 2 x's, and Nathan Dagley with 177, no x.

On Sunday, an 80-shot "across the course" match was fired at 200, 300, and 600 yards. In the combined High Master - Master Class, Thomas Thompson of Bismarck took home first place with an aggregate score of 759 and 23 x's out of the possible 800. His effort was aided by match winners at 200 yards offhand slowfire, 200 yard sitting rapidfire, and 300 yard prone rapidfire with scores of 183 and 3 x's; 197 and 10 x's; and 197 and 4 x's, respectively. Thomas Reiten of Grand Forks held top honors in the 600 yard slow prone match with a score of 185 and 3 x's. Reiten's aggregate of 738 and 14 x's took second place.

In the combined Unclassified - Expert - Sharpshooter - Marksman Class, Travis Carico of Valley City posted the winning aggregate score of 708 and 3 x's. Walter Fairbanks of Bismarck was tops in the 200 yard offhand slowfire match with 178 and 2 x's; junior shooter Ethan Headrick, from Bismarck, fired a 190 with 4 x's in the 200 yard rapidfire event; and Aaron Carico of Valley City scored a 190 and 4 x's in the 300 yard prone rapidfire event. Brendan Headrick of Bismarck took the 600 slow prone match with 177 and 3 x's. Ethan Headrick's aggregate score of 641 and 5 x's won the Junior title for the match.

A total of eleven new shooters over the two days were welcomed by the "old-timers" to the sport of High Power Rifle. With some coaching on positions and wind-doping, they caught on quite well, and all seemed to have a good time. Leon Nesia
