2019 Long Range World Championships (Morgan Shooting Palma in New Zealand)

2005 is a long time ago. In October of that year 14 years ago, I made my first trek to Phoenix, AZ to try to earn a spot on the 2007 US Palma Team. That trip was a great experience, and I was able to continue to shoot in the selection process for the final team. Being in my late 20's at the time, I made several mental and social mistakes. However, when I later washed out of the process, I knew that I could shoot with any of the teammates.

Fast forward 21 years- I earn a spot to shoot for the 2017 Roberts Smallbore Prone Team that competed shoulder to shoulder with the Brits on their home range at Bisley, England. Earning that spot reignited the fire in me for international competition, and it forced me to make the mental choice of whether I wanted to "all out" change myself, work on my position, and get mentally ready for the rigors of making the 2019 US Palma Team. The last two years of putting my smallbore rifle aside validated my thought process to focus on LR and work to better myself.

How do you make the US Palma Team? First you need to earn a spot on the US National Development Team - the selection is firing under a coach for 6, 20 shot strings at 1000 yards, all with a .308 and 155gr bullets. The shooter is responsible for elevation; draw a horizontal line across the target face at the top and another at the bottom of the x-ring to the edge of the target. Every shot fired is measured; if you are within the 10" X ring for elevation no shooter points are removed. Each high or low ten is a 1 point penalty, 3 points for a 9 and 5 points for an 8.

The coach is responsible for wind, so if 8's or 9's show up due to windage but are within the 10" vertical line, the shooter is not penalized. A shooter can lose 8 points per 20 shot string and still make the development team. The last several years there have been auditions shot at Harris in MN. Several local shooters have been added at that location. Marty Gunderson, Erik Rhode, Brian Mrnak and several others have all been added to the team because of these auditions at Harris. I earned my spot on the development team long ago, when the process was newly created at Lodi, WI. If you shoot a team match with other national team members yearly you can stay on the development team. I highly encourage anyone, who is interested, to shoot a trial. Keep in mind that shooters often do not meet the requirement the first time they try.

The final selection for the 2019 US Palma Team was competition at the Canadian National Championships in Ottawa last August. I was fortunate to be asked to attend, and I had spent much of last summer in preparation. I purchased an electronic target and trained more last summer at Moffit, than I had in at least 10 years combined of live fire practice. I knew I needed to shoot more quickly and remove any fliers from my groups. The trip to Ottawa

was great, as my mentor Tom Thompson made the trek along with me, and we saw some excellent shooting. My personal highlights of the trip were shooting a perfect score in one of the team matches, making the Governor General Final (top 50 shooters), and being a firing member for the USA in the America Match- where we won against the Brits and Canadians.

Shortly after our team success in Canada, the final 2019 USA Palma Team was announced, I was blessed to be among the team with other upper Midwest shooters, Brian Mrnak of WI and Erik Rhode of MN. I need to give much credit to these two individuals, as they pushed me harder to be better the last several years. Without those competitors, I would not have worked as hard and probably would not have earned a spot.

Let's move on to New Zealand. Trentham has a reputation for being the most difficult range on the planet. I know how difficult Moffit is. Trentham makes my home range look like a beginner's course in wind reading; no joke. The wind would come from behind you and switch both sides of zeroquickly. My shooting style usually is to chase the spotterthat tactic in NZ was a NO GO....The changes were fast, big, and directional. My individual performance was not terrible, but also not great. I learned a bunch during individuals, but I had to accept and move past some really poor scores. As I looked at the scoreboard, other much more accomplished shooters also had difficulty. The range is BEAUTIFUL- at the base of a mountain that sometimes would have a headwind that fishtailed the same way as it did from behind. The range is nestled between a prison and a golf course- coincidentally two places I really don't want to spend time. We shot the 5V target. In one match at 1K, I shot in order a 1,2,3,4,5.....I know for certain I have never shot a 6,7,8,9,10 in order on US soil. I simply had to chuckle to myself after that performance.

The US had some GREAT performers. Luke Rettmer won the Under 21 world championship. Oliver Milanovic and Brandon Green both made the top 10 individual world champs, and several others were in the top 20, 30 and 50's. I ended worlds in 94th, which is not excellent but I was pretty happy with that placing out of over 400 competitors. I did earn a 5th place overall in one of the 900 yard matches, with one of only 7 cleans shot in that match.

The weather was beautiful. We had a couple days of extreme heat and a day where I wore my rain gear for warmth. Overall, the days were sunny and pleasant to be outside. I was happy to be there in January, when we had negative temperatures in ND. The team was gelling and getting ready for the reason that many of us had been in NZ for two weeks.

Thanks to Morgen, Tami and Mitch for the articles in this edition of our newsletter. I hope that you enjoy them.

A day of practice, then two Palma courses would follow, and the competition would be among the Australians, Brits, South Africans, New Zealanders, Canadians, Channel Islanders, and the USA. Nine firing members of the 16-firing member team had never shot on a Palma team- we had a new plan.

Day One of the Palma Match started with calm winds and good light. The US typically has issues at 800, losing points that we are then forced to make up later. This year we started off better than normal, getting off the line down only 6 points out of a possible 1200. We shot very quickly, and this worked to our advantage as the wind continued to build which meant that the other teams were forced to shoot in more difficult winds. The US won the 800 yard line, and we could all feel a sense of relief and excitement as we moved back to 900. I somehow managed to shoot my first sighter shot on a target that was not mine, however we converted the second sighter and I rattled off a 75-11. Not the best score on the team, but a solid score. Timing of that crossfire was fortunate, but not letting it affect me at all was great for the team. 900 had good conditions, but the wind velocity had grown and more switches were prevalent. We needed to "pick" our way through it; the coaches did well. We lost a combined 36, a respectable number. Australia now showed us their goal of winning the Gold. Australia lost only 18! Wow, they shot great. They had 5 shooters with clean scores for the line; the US only had two 75's. The final match of the day was at 1000 yards. The US was feeling good about our effort and the team was working together well. We had two shooters clean the last yard line of the day- Nate Guernsey and Amanda Elsenboss. We had four other shooters complete 74's.

My 69 was one of the lower scores of the squad; however during our firing usually one person of the four firing members was used as a lead shooter to assist keeping the other shooters in the middle. Instead of losing points on all firing points, we try to only sacrifice on a single point. I was not worried about my score; if it helped our collective team score I am happy to help. After the competition that day, the US was in second place with a collective 3506-330V. The Aussies opened up a large lead with a stellar 3528-378. The Brits were in third with a 3494-304. The South Africans owned fourth with a 3477-309.

It was a great first day. We had many more shots to fire to hold our spot, but collectively the team was in great spirits and proud of our Day One performance. Onto Day Two- again the 800 yard conditions were near perfect. The US shot an excellent yard line with only 2 shots not being 5's or V's. We fired a quality 1196-175. The problem was that the Aussies managed to clean the yard line with a 1200-181. The Brits also got their mojo going with an 1198-152. The US needed to tighten up. I backed up my Day One score with a duplicate 75-11.

900 saw higher wind speeds and more directional changes. We were continually stopping to find the condition that we felt best firing in. Overall, we did a good job, but again were bested by the Aussies and Brits on the yard line. The Aussies lost an excellent 14; the Brits lost 29; and we lost 33. The Brits had now closed the gap of our Day 1 lead and it all would come down to the final yard line for silver.

1000 was crazy - similar conditions to the match where I got annihilated earlier in the week at the long yard line. We drew the middle of the range, and we were confident as firing began. The winds were very fast, directional and both sides of zero. Looking back, we should have shot more quickly early on, we could have saved some more points. However, we didn't know the conditions would continually erode. The Aussies AGAIN showed their domination of the yard line losing only 86, just over 5 down per shooter average. This truly was a miraculous feat in the conditions. The Brits also showed their cohesion and vast experience together and got through the conditions well. The Brits lost 112, right at 7 points per shooter. The South Africans (-121) and New Zealand (-126) teams both had better scores on the final match - showing their ability to better navigate the switching conditions. The US lost 137, meaning over 8 points per shooter. Brandon Green along with Gary Rassmussen shot STELLAR 75s on the final yard line. That is by far the most impressive shooting feat I witnessed in NZ. Only 3 shooters of all teams had 73's and no shooters fired a 74.

The final tally gave Gold to Australia, Silver to Great Britain, and Bronze to the USA (19 points back of silver). I am proud of our accomplishment and am very happy to have been part of it. The next rotation is in South Africa; if the team continues our progress, there is no doubt in my mind that we can better our standing at the end of this 2019 World Championship. It was a great experience and I am very happy to have had the opportunity to attend. As my shooting ended, Amy and I were able to spend the remainder of the week on the south island of New Zealand. She and I have seen a fair amount of geography across the US and beyond- Glacier, Yellowstone, Medora, Stonehenge, and even the Grand Canyon. In my opinion, the Milford Sound Fjords are BY FAR the most beautiful geography I have ever witnessed. We loved New Zealand and HIGHLY recommend traveling there.

One bit of <u>maintenance that is commonly **required**</u> by every firearm here in North Dakota is to make sure that the firearm is removed from its case and allowed to warm up and dry out whenever it is brought in from the cold weather that we enjoy here every fall, winter and spring.

This is very important. Any cold firearm left in its case will suffer from moisture condensation on its surface, in the action and inside the barrel to a varying degree. In no case will the firearm work at its best for long, if neglected in this manner.

Lack of attention to this task is an insult to the firearm and to those who have worked hard to improve the shooting sports opportunities for competitors young and old. So, make sure that you are careful about this during transportation of any firearm that you own or borrow.

I renew my request for more info on Airgun Maintenance. I have a stark lack of response, so far. Rick Jorgenson

Western Intercollegiate Rifle Conference Final Standings

The NDSU Marksmanship Club air rifle and smallbore rifle teams each earned 2nd place finishes in the 16 school Western Intercollegiate Rifle Conference (WIRC) Championship matches held at Purdue University, February 24, 2019. The final WIRC standings are based on four monthly postal matches plus the final shoulder-to-shoulder Championship Match held at Purdue University's range.

The NDSU Air Rifle Team consists of:
Brandon Alexander, a freshman in Construction Management, from Devils Lake, ND;
Sarah Biggers, a sophomore in Radiological Sciences, from Buffalo, ND;
Amanda Hintz, a freshman in Agribusiness, from Bismarck, ND;
Tyler Linneman, a freshman in Crop and Weed Sciences, from Emerado, ND;
Rachel Voigt, a freshman in Animal Science from Halliday, ND.

The team finished with a score of 2273 points out of a possible 2400 points.

In individual scoring, Hintz finished in 2nd place at Purdue with a score of 576 while Alexander finished 3rd with a score of 575. Alexander and Hintz were also named to the 2019 WIRC 1st All Conference Air Rifle Team with total season scores of 2868 and 2857 points, respectively. Linneman was named to the 2nd All Conference Air Rifle Team with a total season score of 2825. NDSU also was named as the 2019 Most Improved Team in air rifle competition.

The NDSU Smallbore Rifle Team (.22 caliber) consisting of Alexander, Hintz, Linneman and Voigt also finished the conference season at Purdue with a score of 2165. In individual scoring, Alexander finished in 2nd place with 558 points and Hintz finished in 3rd place with 553 points. Alexander and Hintz were named to the 2019 1st All Conference Smallbore Rifle Team.

The teams are coached by Mitchell Godbout of Casselton, ND. Godbout was named as the 2019 WIRC Outstanding Smallbore Rifle Coach of the Year. The teams train at the Red River Regional Marksmanship Center in West Fargo and are currently preparing to compete in the National NRA Collegiate Championship Rifle Matches at Ft. Benning, GA in late March.
