Get Over It

Over the last few decades, our nation has progressively adopted political correctness in all things and at all costs. It seems that there is always an excuse for failure and almost no excuse for success.

As Mark Knopfler of Dire Straits wrote it, we want our "Money for Nothing". Those of you who are familiar with the lyrics to that song may also be aware of what a stir they caused back in 1985. For those of you who have not heard the song or may not be familiar with the lyrics, I recommend that you get a copy and listen to it a few times.

The ideas put forth in that song are in strong contrast to the ideals of our nation's founders. 250 years ago, our nation was made up of people who were intimately familiar with the terms apprentice, journeyman and master of any given skill. Today, we are hard pressed to find anyone who is willing to dedicate themselves to incremental effort over time to develop and master any skill.

Instant gratification seems to be the goal of many.

Against this mindset that many in our nation have adopted, it is increasingly difficult to find someone who is willing to undertake the incremental, and often long-term, effort necessary to master our sport of competitive shooting. While we see and recognize those who have mastered the skills necessary to be strongly competitive in our sport, most refer to those people as talented rather than skilled. I have personally observed many people tiptoe into this sport and then step back rapidly when they find that they cannot perform at a high level after only a session or two of casual effort to learn the very fundamentals of the sport of competitive shooting.

I do take some encouragement from the fact that the Knopfler song was followed by the Eagles in 1994 with their song "Get Over It". For those of you who are unfamiliar with the lyrics, the song is about Don Henley's frustration with those who place blame for their failures, mental breakdowns, and financial problems on those who don't deserve it and then believing that the world owes them a favor (a free lunch anyone???).

Over the past few years, I have become more and more involved in the 4-H Shooting Sports. The 4-H Shooting Sports Program has a mission that parallels our own. The National 4H Shooting Sports website states that: "*The focus of all 4-H programs is the development of youth as individuals and as responsible and productive citizens. The National 4-H Shooting Sports Program stands out as an example. Youth learn*

marksmanship, the safe and responsible use of firearms, the principles of hunting and archery, and much more. The activities of the program and the support of caring adult leaders provide young people with opportunities to develop life skills, self-worth, and conservation ethics."

I have often said that it is the parents' job to raise responsible, self-reliant and productive adults. I don't see how this can be accomplished easily while our nation continues to focus on the politically correct principle that there is always an excuse for failure and further that there is no such thing as failure in the classroom or in many of our schoolchildren's endeavors. Ask any successful person how much they learned from failure. Again, Teddy Roosevelt's statement about the man in the arena says it very well.

As a parent who wants to raise a responsible, self-reliant and productive adult, there are very few activities that will help them along that road. I'll say it again. The road well-traveled is the road toward mediocrity. Unfortunately, many travel that road because they were simply never guided to the other path that they could've taken.

The shooting sports offer young people and their parents an enjoyable road to adulthood. They will enjoy their effort almost as much as their success along the way. The 4-H Shooting Sports Program in North Dakota is administered by North Dakota State University through county extension agents and volunteers. Those of you who have developed a skill in the shooting sports and who would like to pass that skill on to a young person should consider volunteering in the 4-H Shooting Sports Program in your county of residence. Give someone a chance to earn a good self-image.

Do a young person a real favor. Introduce them to the competitive shooting sports and support them in their development of the skills necessary to succeed at whatever level their talent will allow. Along the way, they will learn skills that they can apply in almost any effort that their daily life might require of them.

I did not begin to shoot competitively until I was over 25 years old. I regret that I did not get involved in the shooting sports at a far earlier age. Join me and our other volunteers to give a young person the chance to get involved in the shooting sports early in their life.

Outstanding Shooting Results Are Not Accidental

Last year, Bill Brackin decided that he would retire from the sport of competitive pistol shooting. I found that hard to accept because I really enjoyed shooting pistol matches with Bill. James Ladwig and I talked about Bill's decision on our way back and forth to Camp Perry this year, and among other things, we reviewed some of Bill's accomplishments. I thought that you might like to see what dedicated effort over time can accomplish. Here is a partial summary of some of Bill's achievements over the last 35 years or more:

Bill won 39 North State Championships and currently holds or co-holds 14 North Dakota State pistol records. The North Dakota State Championships are as follows:

I have not listed the many NRA Regional and Sectional championship medals that Bill won during the years from 1995 until he elected to stop competing last year. That list is even lengthier than the list of his North Dakota State Championships. As far back as 1978 (34 years ago for those of you who don't want to do the math), Bill fired as a member of a North Dakota Sectional National Conventional Pistol Championship team (civilian sharpshooter). That was way before my time as a conventional pistol competitor.

He earned the Distinguished Pistol Badge # 1070 in 1995. You can find him on the CMP's list of Distinguished Pistol shooters under the incorrect (but somehow almost appropriate) spelling as William Blackin.

He shot his way into the 2600 Club in 1996 and earned the High Master classification in Conventional Pistol that year as well.

Bill has been a member of many strong teams firing in the NRA Sectionals. The Gateway Norskiis air pistol team earned 1st place in Master class in the 2003 NRA Sectional. Then, most notably in 2007, Bill together with Eric Pueppke and Steve Faught won:

North Dakota State Records & Other Records of Note

Congratulations to every one of you who has set a new record so far this year. Good Shooting! Thanks again to Denny Coulter for all of his work in maintaining our state records over the last many years. He sent me the following for your consideration:

Several great records that were set on the NRA A-36 target which is now retired since the NRA adopted the replacement NRA/USA 50 target. Those records date back to 1961 and were unsuccessfully challenged for over 50 years. Now they will never be broken. Many of these open records are held by NDSSA Hall of Fame members Ed Jensen, Denny Coulter, Bill Murrey and Tom Thompson. Sandy Kraus won the National Junior Four Position Championship on the NRA A-36 target with 396. (Fortunately, our North Dakota state records are easily accessed and available on our association's website: <http://ndssa.org/> Check them out)

The 2012 Three Position Metric Sectional and State Championships fired on March 17, 18, & 19 were again dominated by our Junior shooters.

Soren Butler repeated as Sectional Champion with a score of 1133. On the way he shot a new National Junior Standing Record score of 382. Taking the Silver and Bronze were Joe Martin with 1134 and Tom Thompson with 1098. The Buffalo Sharpshooters, a junior team, won the team match.

Joe Martin is the new State Champion shooting a score of 850. On the way Joe fired a new National Open, Civilian, and Junior Record Score of 197, beating the old open record by 6 points. He was followed by Soren with 839 and then by Joe's sister, Becky Martin with 818. Becky's kneeling score of 187 is a new National Collegiate Record. The Buffalo Sharpshooters won the team match with a Junior National Team Record score of 1080.

Get your shooting equipment out and get yourself and it ready for the next match.
